Bhaskar Hazarika's *Kothanadi* is a movie in Assamese, based on four different tales taken from Lakshminath Bezbaruah's widely circulated *Burhi Air Xadhu* (Grandma's Tales). The tales included into the text are of different tastes dealing with the folk beliefs and practices of the people of Assam. This is perhaps one of the unifying threads that bind the otherwise disparate tales. In fact, the movie seems to have achieved a harmonious or unifying effect as far as unfolding the folk life is concerned. However, it is also observed that the movieestablishes a connecting link among the tales; indeed an innovation done by Bhaskar Hazarika. There is no denying the fact that the technique of montage is skillfully used in which the short shots are arranged sequentially to attain the ultimate agenda of showcasing the folk life of the State. In addition, the link that is established among the tales with the engagement of characters is another attempt at scaling the unifying effect in the movie.
